Championship (The Wylie Classic) was

The competition got off to a slow
start on practice day with most teams

previous experience. A lot of the day was spent training drivers, untangling ropes and repairing tow gauges, leaving no time for cross-country flights. (Bugger!)

Unusual for this time of the year, the weather was characterised by weak lift and low thermal heights. The task

A good incentive for the pilots to get away on the first tow because we did not know when towing would stop.

Days 2 and 3 brought up more of the light conditions with 54 and 65km tasks to Goomalling and then Merridin. The good thing was that the Dusties managed to find a driver. Uli, a German backpacker was passing through town. He's a novice hang glider pilot from Germany and was quite happy to spend a week drinking and driving for us around the wheat belt of WA.

Shelley Heinrich showed up a number of the so-called 'advanced' topless pilots with a personal best flight of 22km on Day 2. Shooting to the lead of the Novice/ Floater Class.

Wednesday was blown out, but the day was saved by Muzza who put on another one of his famous spit-BBQs.
